

Folsom to help with Owens park

MONTGOMERY (AP) — Gov. Jim Folsom says he'll try to help Lawrence County officials with their plans to complete a park honoring four-time Olympic gold medalist Jesse Owens in time for the 1996 Atlanta games.

Folsom said Monday he would attend next month's Appalachian Regional Commission meeting in Washington and would try to help the park committee with an ARC grant of \$75,000.

The park is located in Owens' home town of Oakville, about six miles east of Moulton, and is about one-fourth finished. Funding has come from grants and private

sources but more is needed.

"We see a good potential for it not only for the area but also the state," said James Pinion, a member of the Jesse Owens Memorial Park Board.

The board has a \$5,000 grant from an Alabama Council for the Arts but needs more money to commission a statue of Owens, which would cost \$80,000, Pinion said.
